(no word limit). All students experience different challenges throughout their careers, leading to different opportunities and outcomes. We take an evidence-based approach that recognises that for many reasons - such as belonging to a marginalised group (racial, LQBTQI, disability, gender, or beyond), having caring responsibilities, financial disadvantage, being the first in your family to attend university, suffering significant illness or bereavement, and so on - a student's potential is not always accurately reflected in grades. We therefore invite you to frame your application in a context that best reflects you.

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
